Partnership Impact: Year 1

Research Funding: £10,000 towards Aston's Eye Clinic research "Flors"



Dr Flors Vinuela-Navarro

Aston University is the largest Optometry teaching centre in the UK. In 2019 the centre expanded its research into eye problems experienced by children with special needs, providing a much-needed service in the Midlands area led by Dr Flors Vinuela-Navarro (Flors). Following her experience with children with special needs Flors identified the need for portable equipment to take to special needs schools during the periods of testing and data collection.

Wesleyan Foundation's donation enabled Flors to purchase equipment including: five different types of testing equipment, trial frames, a Retinoscope and a Cardiff-Ulster cube (images below of the purchased equipment). Testing for children was able to commence from April 2020, however due to COVID restrictions testing for children has been at a urgent/essential eye care basis:

- 5 children received testing on an urgent/essential eye care basis
- 32 children received testing on a routine eye care basis (from September 2020)

The success of Flor's research has enabled the continual testing of children with special needs and led to the development of Aston Special Assessment and Binocular Vision Clinic.

Images of the purchased equipment:



Test to assess the children's three dimensional vision and perception of depth



Equipment to estimate the power of spectacles needed by the children: trial frame, Retinoscope and trial lens case



Test to measure children's level of vision: Cardiff Acuity Test and Cardiff combined contrast sensitivity test, combined grating test, Keeler LogMAR and Kay pictures.



Equipment to obtain images of the children's back of the eye and examine their eye health: Panoptic with phone and adaptor.

Medical Scholarships Funding for Aston Students

As a result of Wesleyan's kind donation towards Medical Student scholarships, two high achieving students were selected to receive scholarships. Students who were selected for the Wesleyan scholarships had graduated from Aston's Pathway to Healthcare Programme. Scholarships provide students with the opportunity to go to University which, without scholarships, many have fed back that this would not even be considered.

Students that received these scholarships are still participating in their studies, however we look forward to learning of their progress following graduation.

Partnership Impact: Year 2

Research Funding: £10,000 towards Aston's Pathway to STEM and Business

Aston's Pathway to STEM and Business programmes recruit A Level students (aged 16-18) from disadvantaged backgrounds across the West Midlands. The programme sits alongside learners' A Level studies and equips them with the knowledge and skills to apply to University; whilst providing an insight into University life.

Wesleyan Foundation donated £5,000 to each programme which contributed to the running of the programmes for learners. This year the programme activities were adapted to an online setting in line with the government's COVID restrictions. Activities included: e-mentoring, UCAS statement support, A level revision bootcamp, engagement with current Aston students.

Partnership Impact: Year 2

Medical Scholarship Funding for Aston University Students

A following two medical students were selected to receive the Wesleyan scholarship funding in the second year of the partnership.. Students who are selected to receive the scholarships had graduated from Aston's Pathway to Healthcare Programme. The cohort of students who received scholarship funds were asked about how receiving a scholarship has impacted them and the majority noted that it encouraged them to work harder as they have been recognised in this way.

All students that received scholarships in 2020 are currently in their first year of studies, however we look forward to the opportunity to report back the success of our medical students.

Scholarship recipient 2:





Research Funding: £10,000 towards COVID-19 Research Pilot Study

Aston University's academic Dr Michael Larkin is undertaking research to understand people's experiences of assisted breathing interventions and critical care for COVID-19, in order to understand their psychological needs for long-term recovery.

In a pilot study, a small number of Covid-19 survivors who have received ICU care and respiratory support will be invited to participate in a qualitative research study. They will be offered a choice of interview types (telephone, videocall, email) with optional visual materials (e.g. drawings, photographs) to help describe their experiences. We will learn about the best ways to engage survivors in this kind of research, and about their preferred ways of participating. This will help us to develop plans for a future, larger study. Our preliminary qualitative analysis will identify underlying patterns in their accounts, highlighting common experiences, and the meanings associated with them.

Further Wesleyan Medical Scholarships for Aston Students

A further two Medical Students have been awarded scholarships which we look forward to updating Wesleyan Foundation on their progress.
